As the 14th Assembly of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women in Gothenburg had to be postponed this year, the World Officers and others produced an excellent online event entitled 'A New Vision for a Sustainable Future', with news from around the world, and a focus on our response to climate change. As I write, COP26 (to be held in Glasgow in November) and the evidence of climate change around the world have been very much in my mind, and our hearts go out to those communities affected by wildfires, flooding, droughts and tornadoes. A NEW VISION FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

When we made the decision to postpone our 14th World Assembly for a year, we recognised that 2021 could feel like a long 'fallow' year of separation, isolation and waiting. It could also provide an opportunity to bring Federation women together virtually, and to gain experience of organising a global online event in case the pandemic prevented us from meeting physically in 2022. *

The aim of the two day event was to celebrate God's activity through the women of the Federation, and to focus on our response to the current climate crisis, which became ever more urgent as the months passed.

Work started early and the theme was chosen to reflect the biblical texts of Revelation 21: 1–5 and 22: 1–5 as well as the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 13: Climate Action.



World and Area Officers and Helen Kim Memorial Scholars were invited to contribute news items, biblical reflections, music and prayers. The goal was to include something from every geographical Area of our Federation and to involve as many young women as possible in this global event.

A member of the Connexional team of the Methodist Church in Britain recommended P H Productions as a company that had provided technical support for the Methodist Conference in 2020. I approached them and a contract was signed. They provided excellent support throughout, editing items that we uploaded to their drop box, training both myself and the team of interpreters we engaged for seven languages (French, Spanish, Portuguese, Russian, Chinese Mandarin, Korean and Cambodian). Many of these were professional interpreters, well used to working with the World Methodist Council, but few had much experience of working online for such an event as ours. An almost full script and access to unscripted videos were made available to all interpreters before the event began. This aid to preparation was much appreciated, as some contributors spoke rather fast!

Registration was organised by Rachel Allison, who was already experienced in using Eventbrite. She also recruited a small team of other Helen Kim Memorial Scholars to monitor the chat box and 'Q and A' messages that flowed as soon as the Zoom Webinar event began. Around 900 registered as attendees, but some watched in groups viewing one screen. Those who were due to speak live, interpret or monitor the chat box were invited to join via a special link for panellists. P H Productions ran a training session for these individuals the day before the Webinar.

The programme for the event was posted on our website and Facebook and twitter a few days beforehand. An evaluation form was sent out via Eventbrite afterwards and the recordings of both days uploaded to our brand new Youtube.com/WFMUCW. Important news from our World Officers was announced on Day One. Speakers on Day Two included Jo Swinney from A Rocha International; Liz Lee from United Methodist Women; Mollie, Irene and Jessica, Climate ambassadors with 'Climate Justice for All'; and Hilary Evans from Methodist Women in Britain. The technicians ensured the live speakers, PowerPoint slides and videos all occurred in the correct order and the programme proceeded smoothly. One technician was assigned to support the interpreters throughout the event, helping teams of two for each language to work effectively.

A copyright licence was obtained for use of hymns and the appropriate acknowledgements included in PowerPoint slides. Interpreters were invited to send in their invoices promptly and were generous in their charges, recognising we are a non-profit organisation run by volunteers with a limited budget. We were extremely grateful to the British Methodist Church for their grant towards our costs for providing interpretation. I extend my heartfelt thanks to ALL who contributed to this ground-breaking event.



Meet a Mission Partner

Our Woman in Kenya

Mission Partner Dr Claire Smithson shares something of her work at the Maua Methodist Hospital in Eastern Kenya.

I have worked in Maua Methodist Hospital since 1989. I have had many different responsibilities over the years but currently I'm the doctor in the HIV/AIDs and Palliative Care Clinic, and I'm involved in training clinicians from all over Kenya. I am also the Director of Pharmacy and Director of Laboratory services.

I felt very proud of my team as they responded to the needs of a 15-year-old HIV positive girl. After her mother died when she was 12, Florence (not her real name) has cared for her two younger siblings, aged 6 and 3 years. Florence became pregnant when her step-father raped her.

In June Florence was admitted when she went into labour. She had nothing that the other expectant mothers have—no clothes except what she stood up in, no slippers (flip flops), no soap, no towel, no baby clothes, not even a *leso* (a cloth used to wrap around the waist, or to wrap around the upper body to carry a baby in).

However, a donor had ensured that she would not be charged for the admission and delivery costs, and on admission the Clinical Officer, two of the pharmacy staff, and the wife of one of them clubbed together to buy Florence what she needed during her admission, and to clothe the baby. They showed such compassion for one patient.

Florence had a Caesarean section on 21st June and delivered a 3kg (6½lb) baby girl. Both are doing well.

We might not be able to solve the problems of the world, but we can do what we can, where we can, with what we have. These staff demonstrated that working in a Christian hospital is so different from working in a government one, by showing Christian love in such a practical way. This is one of the reasons that mission hospitals are still here.

Covid has affected our hospital very much, like so many other mission hospitals. Our staff took a pay cut last July and it still has not been reversed because of lack of income. People fear to come to the hospital. We have had extra expenses with buying PPE, masks for all staff, etc. Staff are stressed. But there is a good side, and we praise God for His blessings.

Please hold Dr Claire, Barbara, and all the staff and patients at the Maua Hospital in your prayers, along with all our Mission Partners, often working in difficult situations. News of two projects supported by MWiB gifts and grants

Hope for Girls and Women in Tanzania

The 'Hope for Girls and Women' project in Tanzania runs two safehouses for women and girls escaping FGM, forced marriage, sexual abuse and domestic violence. There are weekly counselling sessions, and reconciliation work is done with the girls and their families, enabling some of them to return home. The project works with communities to prevent gender-based violence in all forms, and also provides advocacy for victims in order to bring perpetrators to justice.

The two houses are currently home to over 100 girls who receive food (much of which they grow in their own garden), clothing, and health care, as well as education and training opportunities. There are 32 girls in primary school, 33 in secondary education, and 37 undertaking vocational and skills training in tailoring, agriculture, soap and batik making, food processing, hotel management, hospitality, tour guiding, and entrepreneurship.

In 2020, the project received an Empowerment Gift from MWiB of £1,500, which was put to practical use in the safehouses, buying mattresses, mosquito nets, shoes and clothes, and hygiene and sanitary products.

Earlier this year, Tresparrett Methodist Church near Camelford, Cornwall, received a Social and Community Action Grant from MWiB for the equipping of a new kitchen at the church. The grant of £1,000 bought a cooker, hob, fridge and dishwasher, shown in the photographs below.

The congregation at Tresparrett is now looking forward to reopening the church following lockdown, and to welcoming the congregation, the local community, and visitors to the area back onto the premises. The new kitchen will enable them to serve breakfasts and lunches, to hold coffee mornings and cream teas, and to run events for families and children, including Messy Church, a Christingle service, and their annual Easter Egg Roll.

Go and bear fruit—fruit that will last

We have recently received the following statement from World Secretary Mataiva Robertson:



“The World Executive met recently to discuss the 14th World Assembly in light of the Covid-19 pandemic. As you can appreciate, the impact of Covid-19 including travel restrictions and quarantine requirements vary from country to country across the globe. Some are beginning to open up their borders, while others have got a long way to go yet before they can start to even think about opening up for international travel.

“We believe that for us to hold such an event would create huge risk both for our own members and for the local community in Sweden. It would also likely attract unwanted publicity that wouldn't reflect well on us, especially as a Christian organization.

“Therefore the decision to hold the 14th World Assembly in August 2022 will remain, but it will be a virtual online assembly and not in person in Sweden as initially planned. This decision was not easy to make, but after much discussion and prayer, we firmly believe it is the right thing to do. We must stand together as one; it would not be fair to hold such a key event where only a few could attend whilst many of our sisters would be unable to join through no fault of their own.

“Planning is underway on how best to undertake online elements and aspects of the assembly such as the installation service, business meetings, Helen Kim programme etc.

“The World Officers will provide regular updates via our website www.wfmucw.org, Facebook and Twitter. Thank you for your patience as we navigate through this together. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to email me on world.secretary@wfmucw.org”
